## Message from the Venue Manager - Connie Hoffman

I was hired by the DCHS Board to serve as Venue Manger in November, 2015. The Delaware County Historical Society held its first open house in February 2016. Our first wedding was held on May 21, 2016, and since then, we have held 65 weddings in the barn and on the Meeker Homestead, plus more than 35 other events, such as corporate retreats, retirement, graduation, Christmas and birthday parties. I handle bridal appointments as well as other duties that include: janitorial, gardener, decorating, building, painting and other jobs that a 170 year old building and 6 acres require. Bridal season runs May through October - the busy season has required us to add part-time assistants, Kelly Barry and Allie Zarley.

There have been many challenges, but when one works out of an old barn, nothing surprises me. Broken pipes, frozen furnaces, bats and birds, over flowing urinals etc. And recently the neighborhood peacocks squawking during last weekend's wedding, which brought the Delaware police department on a 911 call to the barn because a neighbor thought someone was screaming for help! If you haven't heard a peacock's mating call, stop by sometime.

We have made many improvements to the barn and grounds. In May, 2016, the gazebo was relocated from a donor in Upper Arlington and a paved walkway with landscaping was installed, so now there is a beautiful, intimate area for outdoor weddings. Last summer we installed a high efficient heating and cooling system for the venue space. Most recently, the bridal dressing room in the Meeker House was upgraded with new floor and water closet. This month we will be installing a new floor to the kitchen in the barn.

There is much more to do, both to preserve this historic building and to make it more usable for events. Last month, the upper floor was cleaned and stripped of all electrical wiring, and temporary lighting has been installed in preparation for the removal of walls, ceilings and modern additions that were made to the barn during its time occupied by Garths Auctions. Dan Troth, a local barn expert, will serve as general contractor overseeing a long list of tasks, including structural improvements that will help to preserve the Barn at Stratford for another 170 years.

If you have not yet had the chance to see the inside of the barn, please consider attending an upcoming DCHS program—or stop by, I love showing off our jewel on Stratford road.

#### Carson's Quiz Answers (from front page)

- 1. By taking core samples of the beams in the barn, it was determined that they were from trees cut in the winter of 1847, and very likely used in the construction of the barn around 1848. (This dating process is known as dendrochronology.)
- 2. Bank barns are built into a hillside to permit access on two levels. Wagons could be pulled up to the second floor level using the slope of the hill as an access ramp. The first floor of the bank barn is used for animal pens with access doors to permit the animals to go out to pasture. - 3. According to the Farmers Almanac: farmers would seal their barns with linseed oil, which is an orange-colored oil derived from the seeds of the flax plant. To this oil, they would add a variety of things, most often milk and lime, but also ferrous oxide, or rust. Rust was plentiful on farms and because it killed fungi and mosses that might grow on barns, and it was very effective as a sealant. It turned the mixture red in color.

# Oral History Project Partner Received Award for Service-Learning

Dr. Nancy Pine was recently awarded the David Hoch Memorial Award for Excellence in Service, in recognition for her outstanding work with the Delaware County Historical Society's Oral History Project. She joined the faculty at Columbus State Community College in 2010 where she incorporates service learning in all of the writing and composition courses that she teaches. Most recently she began partnering with the Society to have her students record the oral histories of Delaware County residents.

The project has been offered to students for 3 terms: it was piloted in Autumn 2016; in Spring 2017, students interviewed members of the Lucy Depp community, an African-American settlement in Delaware County; in Autumn 2018 they interviewed World War II veterans and those who served on the home front. At the end of each term, a celebration event is held at which each student presents a copy of their paper to the person they interviewed and wrote about.
