
To promote and sustain interest in the history of Delaware County, Ohio, through historic preservation and education.

We collect and preserve



We launched a sustainability campaign this year as a continuation of our earlier capital campaign. Our emphasis was raising funds for capital improvement projects such as restoring our 170 year old barn, ensuring that it will still be standing in the 22nd century and longer. Thanks to our donors, we raised \$63,615 in donations in the past twelve months and are expected to receive state funding for barn renovation. We are making good progress and are continuing structural projects, but now we are raising money for programs and operations, in order to meet our dual missions of education and historic preservation. We serve the public in many ways, providing educational programs tied in with the curriculum requirements of our public schools, programs for the public, exhibits at our museums, and more. We depend on members and donors



for our funding, augmented by grants that require matching funds. Programs throughout the year

This year, we "thought outside the box" bringing diverse community programs and events requested by you — our supporters. Please reach out to us and let us know what you would like to see in the future.

We started the year in January with a program on Famous Firsts in History, presented by antiques expert Steve Bemiller, who educated the audience on early inventions such as the vending machine and typewriter.

A great crowd attended our February program given on Delaware Homes on the Underground Railroad which were active Underground Railroad "stations," and still exist today.

Our March program, sponsored by the Ohio Humanities Council, featured speaker Dr. Brad Lepper, Curator

of Archaeology for the Ohio History

Connection. His program, Earthworks
& American Indians in Central Ohio, was on the early inhabitants of our area, as well as various earthworks they built which are located in Central Ohio.

Leading county historian and
Historical Society President
Emeritus, Brent Carson gave a lively program in April on the History of Sports Venues
in Delaware County including where they were located
and when they began. Audience participation added to
the event as attendees spoke up with memories about the
sports venues of their youth.

In conjunction with the opening of the Notable Women exhibit in the Meeker Museum, the May program was also on Notable Women from Delaware County. Sponsored by Manos, Martin & Pergram Co., LPA, the presentation celebrated the accomplishments and lives of six renowned, local women through storytelling, reenactments, and reminiscences.

The June program, given by railroad enthusiast and expert Jack Hilborn, who is also the Delaware County Historical Society board president and longest serving board member, was on the History of Railroads in Delaware County. This entertaining and informative program, sponsored by Hilborn Insurance and Willow Brook Christian Communities, was on one of our most popular topics and covered the five major railroads that came to Delaware County; the Columbus, Delaware & Marion Interurban system, and the City of Delaware Streetcar

System. It was a very



We gave two programs in July. Partnering with Arena Fair Theater, attendees enjoyed a Mark Twain reenactor as well as the famous sleight-of-hand magician, "Nate the Great." Also in July, Brent Carson, the Society's President Emeritus, presented Floods in Delaware County. Sponsored by Fidelity

Federal Savings and Loan, the program reviewed the floods which occurred in Delaware County between 1898 and 1959.

Three programs and events were held in August. The first one, titled The Power of Place was presented by Barbara Powers, the administrator of the National Register of Historic Places

program in Ohio. And the second August program was A Walk Down East Winter Street, given by Brent Carson and board member and local history expert,

buildings. Also in August we held the "Band

at the Barn" featuring The Delaware Community Concert Band. Due to expected inclement weather, the band performed inside the Barn and was enjoyed by adults and children alike.

The Society's railway exhibit at the Delaware County Fair in September featured artifacts and rare photographs of trains, CD&M cars, disaster photos, maps of routes and the people of the railroad. Our display included a real bell used on an engine, which could be rung by the public, for a donation.

What is becoming our "Signature Event" was given in October. This year's Oak Grove Cemetery Walk featured 18 costumed interpreters who shared their stories at tombstones throughout the cemetery to a sold-out crowd.

Also in October, The Spanish Flu Epidemic and Early 20th Century Medicine in Delaware explored the devastation of the Spanish Flu, and its connection to World War I. Presented by historical society board member and retired physician

Dr. Alice Frazier and DCHS volunteer and educator Steve Shaw, this interesting look at one of the deadliest epidemics in history was sponsored by Willow Brook Christian Communities and Fidelity Federal Savings and Loan.

Over 300 people came to the guided tours of the historic Dela-

Due to restoration work expected to be done at the Barn at Stratford, our January, February and March programs next year will be held at the William Street Methodist Church in Delaware.



From the Executive Director

"We've never done that before!"

This is a sentiment that is expressed frequently during historical society meetings. It originated as a tongue-in-cheek statement from one of our board members (often given in mock horror). This always brings smiles and even chuckles, but the thought expressed with that comment is that we are doing so many things we would never have dreamed of a few years ago. We do not fit in the typical historical society mold anymore, which is a good thing. We continue to form committees, create projects and educate the community in new ways. Here are the highlights of some of the exciting new things we accomplished this year:

- The new **Sustainability Campaign**, launched this spring, exceeded expectations. Combined with the previous Capital Campaign, we received over \$63,400 in donations over the last 12-month period. These funds have been directed towards projects such as Barn renovation, repairs and maintenance, and operating expenses.
- We created a highly functioning **Facilities Committee**, which oversees all projects related to the 4 structures and properties owned by the DCHS.
- We received nearly \$34,000 from the Delaware County Commissioners which will be used to fund repairs, renovation and restoration to the Meeker House and Barn as well as supply the resources needed to install signage on the Meeker property.
- We were informed that we will be receiving \$250,000 in state funds from the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission which will be used to support much needed renovations in the Barn. This process will begin in January and last for several months.
- We created a traveling Bus History Tour geared towards older adults.
- This year we experienced an **elevated presence in the community and increased media coverage** over previous years.
- A new **state-of-the-art AV system** was installed in the Barn, thanks to a generous donor.
- There are **2 new self-guided tours**, available on our website: Delaware County homes which were on the Underground Railroad and the Oak Grove Cemetery Walk.
- We created a **system of videos used for Meeker Museum visitors** who are not able to climb stairs to see the exhibits on the second floor.
- Record crowds attended our programs this year. Most of

these programs were free, offered as a service to the community. Many of these programs featured reenactors who brought history to life for students and adults.

- **26 weddings** were held at the Barn at Stratford. The thriving venue business greatly improves our sustainability.
- We expanded our **Oral History project** to "tell the important stories" of Delaware County by the residents who lived here.
- We met with people who used to live and work on the Meeker property. Many of them provided photographs and details which will be used for the creation of displays of the property and Stratford area.
- **Ground penetrating radar** was done on the 6-acre Meeker property. This process reveals anomalies in the soil to locate the remnants of long-gone structures.

What to expect next year:

- We will be forming a subcommittee of our education committee which will research the history of our county's African American population.
- We are also in the process of organizing a children's history day camp.
- We will be receiving a collection of artifacts which were found on the Coughlin Crossing development site and donated by Delaware Developers. This will be part of our Stratford history exhibit.
- We will be receiving a donation of the Stratford Millworker House from Coughlin Crossing developers which will allow us to create a special museum in that structure.
- We will continue to expand our oral history project and will be completing an oral history project on the Little Brown Jug Harness races, which will be unveiled in 2020, in time to celebrate the 75th year of the iconic event.
- We are planning a diverse and exciting program lineup.
- ullet Next spring, we will hold a large antique show in the Barn a first for the Historical Society.

If you would like to participate in these exciting new ventures, please let us know. We are always in need of volunteers, donations, members, and supporters. Come along for the ride. It will be a fun one! I promise.
