A Winning Partnership

This spring the Delaware County Historical Society was approached by a representative of the R.B. Hayes Heritage Fund Committee with a request to partner in its goals. The R.B. Hayes Heritage Committee grew from a desire to provide a statue of Rutherford B. Hayes for the city of Delaware. When donations were solicited and expenses paid, a small surplus remained.

The Committee has proposed using the surplus funds to generate new revenue to be used for a Rutherford B. Hayes Scholarship fund. The scholarship will be for \$2,000 with the hope that two awards might be made each year.

Funding for the scholarships will be through the R.B. Hayes Day event, held annually on October 4th at Hayes High School. Additionally, the Committee is planning a R.B. Hayes Center of American Political History (CAPH) that is proposed to be located at the Willis Education Center.

A request was presented from the Hayes Heritage Fund Committee at the March meeting of the DCHS Board of Trustees. At its April meeting, trustees discussed the details of the stewardship of the funds that will be entrusted to the Historical Society for accountability and fiscal control and the responsibilities of the Committee to: 1) generate funds

through the R.B. Hayes Day event, 2) be responsible for selection of the scholarship recipients and 3) work with Historical Society staff and volunteers to create and maintain the Hayes Center of American Political History. The Board unanimously approved the proposed joint effort of the Hayes Heritage Fund Committee and the DCHS. This new facet of Historical Society's community action reflects the Society's commitment to being a positive presence in Delaware County Community and enriches the Hayes Heritage Committee with the artifacts and resources of the Historical Society - a winning partnership.

■ Spring 2022: Students, Schools, and Local History with the DCHS Curriculum Committee

One of the most popular school presentations offered by the Curriculum Committee is the Artifact Cart program. Our volunteers present a variety of artifacts in classrooms, gymnasiums, libraries and community rooms across the county in elementary school buildings. We have artifact programs for Grades 1, 2, and 3 and also one on American Indian artifacts. Students are always entertained by figuring out

what some of these items could be or how they were used back in the day.

Guided by the Ohio Content Standards, we emphasize a "Then and Now" approach to these artifacts; from using a curling iron that had to be heated in a fire or on a stove to the use of a slate for writing, or grasping a pole to reach items at the top of grocery store shelves. And what were ice tongs used for? Or a darning egg? Or a hair receiver? Many items bring laughs and giggles because the use of the artifact was unimaginable to students today.

Congratulations to An Outstanding DCHS Volunteer

We were very pleased to receive notice that our own President Emeritus, Brent Carson will be receiving the 2022 Heidelberg University Outstanding Alumni Award of the Year. This prestigious honor is given each year to an alumnus in recognition of lifetime accomplishments and contributions to his/her profession, community and society at large. It is considered to be the highest alumni award.

A graduate of the Heidelberg class of 1970, Brent has spent his entire professional career primarily teaching sixth grade social studies at Willis Jr. High School. His teaching style was unique with activities such as wearing a toga and leading his students through tubs of ice water to re-enact Caesar's crossing of the Rubicon, writing and performing medieval plays and writing and performing the Marathon Runner's Rap.

Brent has had a long interest in history, particularly local history. As a teacher, he incorporated "Delaware Extras" as a weekly extra credit exercise for his classes. He formed an after-school extra-curricular group called the Willis History Club. Its purpose was to promote and preserve the history of the school, community and county. Brent retired from teaching in 2005 to devote more time to promoting local history.

Carson has served on the Delaware County Historical Society's board president for many years and as president for 11 years. As a key member of the DCHS Curriculum Support Committee, he reenacts historic figures for programs to students, and routinely gives presentations throughout the community on history topics. He received the Teacher of the Year award in 2002 from the Delaware Rotary Club and in addition, he was inducted in 2014 into the Delaware City Schools Distinguished Alumni Hall of Fame, which recognizes alumni and friends who have excelled in their careers, athletics or the arts.

Congratulations to our own Brent Carson - an inspiration to us all!
