Across Ohio, historical societies and museums are putting the past into digital form. Through these efforts, photos and important paper documents are being stored in the most up-to-date format possible, thereby increasing the likelihood that they will survive long into the future. These projects are promoted by the Ohio Local History Alliance (OHLA), which makes grants available to members each year with a maximum cap of \$2,500. Collections which are chosen for digitization are those with local and/or statewide significance. The 2021 awards have been announced, and The Delaware County Historical Society will be receiving the maximum




amount of \$2,500, for the latest installment of their project to digitize the Delaware Daily Journal Herald newspaper between October 1, 1908 and October 15, 1912.



As most of you know, in early April we initiated our plan to purchase of the historic Delaware County Sheriff's Residence and Jail through a land contract. We will be creating plans to showcase the iconic building by providing tours, events, exhibits, and restoration strategies to continue to preserve the Jail. We are beginning to put together a Fund-Raising Committee and you will be hearing more from us and them in the near future.

That's Entertainment!

Join us for our first live program of 2021! On Wednesday, August 18th, Benny Shoults, Volunteer for the Delaware County Historical Society, will take you back to the city of Delaware, over one hundred forty years! The program will cover a time from 1879 to 1934 and will revolve around the once grand City Opera House in downtown Delaware as well as other Delaware entertainment venues during "The Golden Era of Entertainment". Attendees will hear the stories about the 1,050 seat auditorium which



graced the second floor of City Hall. Celebrities who appeared there included John Philip Sousa who led his band in "Stars and Stripes Forever." also appearing were Mark Twain, William McKinley, temperance advocate Carrie Nation, statesman William Jennings Bryan, Hollywood director (and Delaware Native) Vincente Minnelli, Ben Hur author General Lew Wallace, and abolitionist Henry Ward Beecher.
