

Feature Facility: The Meeker Story

Two thousand and sixteen was the year the Meeker Homestead Museum was first introduced to the community.

This beautiful, historic Federal style house and its six acres were gifted to our Delaware County Historical Society by the Porter family in 2010. The home's history to the Stratford area, which was once a thriving mill town, and to the city of Delaware, has unfolded since then as we learn more about the life of Forest Meeker who built this house, and helped develop the community in which it stood.

The Meeker Museum is unique in that it is a "museum in a house." Visitors not only have the opportunity to see how the Meeker family and others in the early 1800s lived by viewing our three period appropriate rooms, but can also explore exhibits of local and state interest in our other rooms.

One of these rooms, The Delaware Gallery, has rotating exhibits, such as the previous *2020 Connecting Threads* exhibit,



with its pre-Civil War Barn Loom. Exhibit rotation allows for fresh displays to be presented to the public throughout the year. This means that our museum always has something exciting and educational to offer.

Presently we are continuing the restoration of this historic property, both outside, and in its period

The winner of our name-the-newsletter contest is Mike Yohe. Although Mike and his wife Nancy live in Valparaiso Indiana, Mike's roots lie in Delaware County. He was born in Delaware County some 85 years ago, but as he says, the story goes back more than 200 years, to fourth great grandparents. A mere dozen years after Delaware County was formed, Joel and Susanna (Phelps) Cowles are said to have come to Ashley from New York about 1820, and several of their (then adult) children, including Jabez, wound up in Delaware County. The family surnames include: Yohe, Tryon, Dunlap, Cowles, Chamberlain, and Converse. When asked how he came up with the name he responded "It popped into my head unbidden" and he felt he had to send it to us. Mike told us it made his day to learn that he had won the contest. Thank you, Mike, and to all that entered our contest.

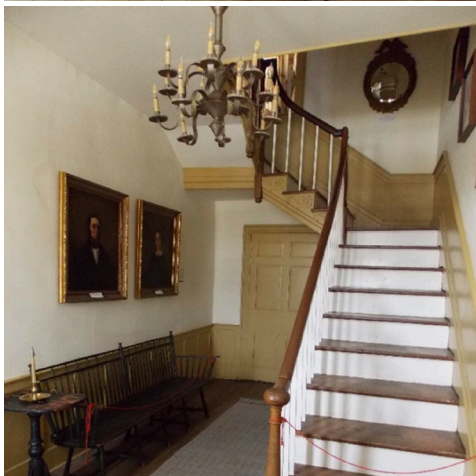


Since We Last Met

■ Programs

Our Programs Committee prepared a diverse and wonderful series of presentations and walking tours for 2021. In October participants were guided through downtown by the Society's Brent Carson for the "Young and Old Rutherford B Hayes Walking Tour." Re-enactor Devon Hardwick portrayed Rutherford

■ Annual Meeting Presentation on Frank Packard

The Annual Meeting (November 17, 2021) was a huge success! We had about 100 people at the event, who enjoyed a presentation by architectural historian Barbara Powers speaking about the architecture of Delaware

native, Frank L. Packard. She noted that while working with Joseph Yost, Packard designed many of the buildings on the OSU campus as well as many homes and buildings in Delaware. These buildings included Asbury Methodist Church, the Steeves block in downtown Delaware, OWU's University Hall, and Gray Chapel, Sanborn Hall, and Edwards gym.

Numerous accounts of Packard's life mention that he was involved in over 3,400 designs, many of which were public buildings such as courthouses, hospitals, libraries, and schools.

■ Arena Fair Theatre

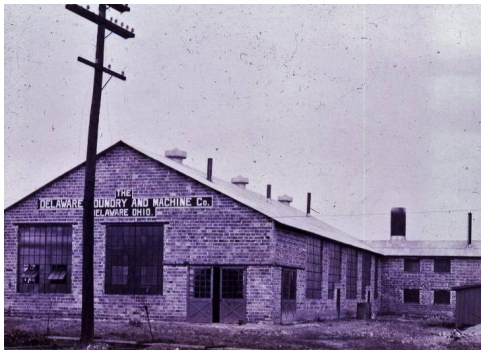
