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Update: The Barn at Stratford

How do the contractors keep the rain and snow from leaking to the lower level of the Barn at Stratford? The first photo shows the answer – a false roof which catches it all as we continue to host weddings, meetings, parties and programs at The Barn at Stratford!



Work continues on the Barn at Stratford roof replacement. (Shown is the beginning of the south roof removal.) The project consisted of removing the existing leaking metal roof and damaged wood rafters, removing failing wood timber eave members, and damaged roof purlins and replacing them with new rough framing timber as well as installing a new metal roofing made out of Galvalume.

When the weather warms up, our contractor will begin the work on the south wall and replace the missing and damaged stone, using a historic lime-based mortar. Midstate Contractors from Marion is in charge of this restoration project, which is funded through the State of Ohio's biennial Capital Budget and managed by the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission. This will complete the \$1,000,000

four-year renovation of our beautiful 1848 barn, which was supported by State



Senator Andrew Brenner. It is a privilege and a joy to know that collectively we have saved this amazing 175-year-old piece of history!

Early Schools - 1800's and Beyond in Delaware County

The DCHS Curriculum Committee recently provided a program at Smith Elementary School on what it was like to go to school in the early days of Delaware County. With an introduction to one-room schools and pot- bellied stoves and walking miles to school, after

morning chores were finished, these second-grade students were divided into three groups for a hands-on experience for those early learning days. One group went to the slates and chalk session and practiced a few math problems and rhyming words; another group went to the hornbook session to get a feel for what it was like to learn to read before books were available in those pioneer school days; and the final group got to experience actual McGuffey Readers and see how early students not only practiced their reading and writing skills but also learned about elocution and recitation. The groups rotated to the different tables throughout the morning sessions. A guestion-and-answer period followed the presentation. A new school experience using old-school resources!



Our activities have been judged to be valuable by receipt of several grants or recognition for artistic efforts:

• An Ohio Arts Council ArtSTART grant for restoration of the Society's fraktur (folk art)

- An ArtSTART grant for Cultural Communities of Delaware County: Early Settlers and American Indians, 1770-1850, a program of vignettes by costumed reenactors focusing on early Delaware County.
- Recently we learned of support from the ICA Art Conservation for review of 16 paintings on canvas, wood and paper, some of the oldest paintings in our collection. A professional conservator will evaluate the works to assist us in prioritizing the stabilizing, treating and preserving the paintings for current and future generations.

We will continue to restore, preserve and exhibit varied artistic artifacts in our collection and offer outstanding programs and activities to tell the diverse stories of our county.
