



COMMUNITY VISIBILITY

We Collect and Preserve

Between October 1, 2023, and September 30, 2024, the Cryder Library volunteers have cataloged 2,335 items, to make the total items cataloged 28,703. We have 12,153 available at DelawareOhio. PastPerfectOnline.com. The online records include 10,876 photos and 95 records which link to an electronic version of the publications. Cryder volunteers have answered 79 guestions from the public and assisted with research in support of the Society programs, newsletter articles and exhibits. Phase 2 of 3 planned changes in the Cryder Research Library was completed by moving/ removing walls and shelves for better exhibit space and less visual clutter. A new exhibit replaces the exhibit that was installed in 1977 (see top photo in the far right sidebar).

A digital copy of the Delaware Daily Journal Herald is now available on OhioMemory. org from 1902 to 1929, which makes it easy to learn what was happening in Delaware County 100 years ago.

Our Volunteers

Between October 2023 and September 2024, 85 active volunteers reported an amazing 14,042 hours! Our volunteers work on a variety of projects including cataloging artifacts, researching, museum docents and monitors, gardening, and of course committee and board members. The estimated value of this service, according to IndependentSector.org, is nearly \$470,267!

We Generate Interest in Our History

We celebrate another successful year filled with tours, and new exhibits at our five museums and offsite at local sites, as well as offerings of community programs serving over 3500 students and adults.

We held several Victorian Teas this year at the Nash House and added to the Willis Records Center exhibits with new text panels about the Brown Jug, and School Days, along with a display case on Voting. This was a highly visible location this year with the Delaware County Board of Elections there. The next display at that location will present the life and work of our Mr. Frank B. Willis. At First Fridays and during the Arts Festival, we were able to open the Historic Jail and Sheriff's Residence for tours and will continue to do so, weather permitting.

Our Oral History project continued to roll along this year with interviews about 100-year + Businesses (OWU, and Ohio Living: Sarah Moore) as well as "First Women" which culminated into a special program in August (see bottom 2 photos on the right sidebar).

We continue to provide entries in Clio (theclio.com) which works by using Google Maps to show the history and other information about a historic location or building. Delaware County already has nearly 40 entries!

We have taken on the ambitious effort of compiling a list of county barns built before 1950. Based on a similar effort in Wayne County, we want to archive as much information on these barns as possible, so very important as these symbols of agriculture are disappearing from our landscape.



UPCOMING PROJECTS

New Parking Lot!

We were recently informed that we will receive funding from the State's Capital Budget to install and expand our parking lot at the Barn at Stratford. This will help ensure more space for school buses as well as a mud-free parking area for our many event guests. We are deeply grateful to State Senator Andrew Brenner for once again, championing our cause and seeing that the state budget includes our request.

Stabilizing the Meeker House Stairs

We have received a grant

from the Ohio History Fund to provide the work needed to ensure the 201 year old Meeker House stairs are safe and stable for visitors. The work will be completed before the spring reopening.

WE EDUCATE

Among our most requested school programs are Early Settlers and the American Indians and Long Ago Days. We continue to provide special Tote Bags full of lesson plans and educational information to local 3rd grade teachers.

This year's award-winning "The Journey to Delaware County" exhibit at the Meeker Homestead Museum continued to draw crowds particularly with our elementary and middle school students. The exhibit will be upgraded this winter when museum curator Benny Shoults and his team begin to install the upcoming exhibit "Wilderness Transformed", which will reopen next spring. Both exhibits have been funded through grants from and administered by the Delaware County Foundation - The Ron Sabatino Family Fund, and the Charles H and Betty J Sheets Family Donor Advised Fund. Many thanks to these folks and their families for ensuring we can continue our efforts.

This year the Nash House offered an exhibit on the "Roaring Twenties." This coincided with the "Bootleggers vs. the Sheriff" exhibit at the Historic Jail. Upcoming at Nash is "The Englishman: John Robinson, Artist and Craftsman." If you attended the Delaware County Fair then you saw our DCHS booth highlighting agriculture, designed by Steve Schmidt and Benny Shoults.

2024 PROGRAMS & EVENTS

We began with a Cemetery Walk at Oak Grove Cemetery in October 2023 with reenactors portraying individuals such as Frederick M. Bauereis, Ezra Griswold, Clarence Hazelton, Delphina Mendenhall and Mary Grady, among others. We also held a Victorian Tea in October at the Nash House Museum. In November, Brent Carson gave a presentation on his new book, *Carried Treasures*, which he wrote in collaboration with Ric Stranges. January's Zoom program was on "Delaware County Industrial History: The Village of Stratford, from Mills to Auto Sales." In February, we had a return visit from Dr. Ted McDaniels, courtesy of Ohio Humanities, presenting "Understanding Black History Through Black Music, Part 2."

In anticipation of the upcoming total eclipse, our March program featured astronomer Tom Burns, presenting "Solar Eclipses: In the Shadow of the Moon." The event was a preview of our Eclipse Traditions program held during the eclipse. In April, Nancy Fleming and Watson Walker, Jr. presented "Communities: The Black Communities in Delaware County before 1860". In May we held a program about the life of a Galena native, Jay Norton Dyer, Delaware County's Pioneer Naval Aviator. In June, Steve Schmitt and Bill Rietz presented "Swimming in Delaware County." In June, we also held the Annual Stratford Festival and Ice Cream Social. July's program was given by DCHS volunteer, Beverly Larson who presented "The History of the Girls' Industrial School.

In August, volunteer Karen Cowan moderated a panel discussion with "First Women of Delaware County." Eight woman who were "the first females" or "near first females" in their professions talked about how they earned their positions, what aided in their journey and what obstacles they met as they navigated their careers.

The Program Committee is continuing to work on 2025 and 2026 programs. The theme for 2025 is Agriculture in Delaware County.

This year we have hosted 27 weddings and a record 42 special events, which included retirement parties, celebrations of life, birthday parties, school celebrations and graduation parties. We also hosted an ongoing reservation with the North Unitarian Universalist Congregation, standing reservations with the Chamber of Commerce, and 3 auctions with Amelia Jeffers.

Each year we are honored to support the memory of local loved ones as a space for Celebrations of Life. This year we celebrated the life of DCHS Volunteer T. K. Cellar.

Memorable events in the barn include the Delaware Ohio Pride adult prom and a company party that included a live mariachi band and outdoor games including a mechanical bull.

The Eclipse Traditions program was a life-changing experience that honored the last time a total eclipse occurred

in Ohio during the time of Tecumseh. We paid tribute by focusing on the stories we know and the evidence we have of Indigenous and Tribal people in this area.

Speaking of culture, we are fortunate enough to live in a diverse area and have a venue flexible enough to accommodate all kinds of celebrations and cuisine. Events highlighting our ever-changing community include many Indian families having held baby blessings and sari parties. A Brazilian ranch family wedding was held with Brazilian cuisine and a lively party. No matter what the occasion might be, we are always open to finding a way to make it unique and beautiful.

This past spring's Eclipse Traditions and the summer's Stratford Festival and Ice Cream Social were just a few of the highlights that brought our community together in celebration. However, with such success comes ongoing challenges. As stewards of six historic buildings—most of which date back to the 1800s—we frequently face maintenance issues. Every week seems to present a new leak or clog, and while we are committed to preserving these treasures, it requires significant time and resources. We rely heavily on donations and memberships to keep our operations running smoothly.

While we enjoyed a robust year for weddings and events, the increasing number of event venues opening within the county presents new hurdles in securing bookings. Thankfully, Melissa Stroupe is more than equipped to tackle this challenge. I am immensely grateful for her leadership and the hard work of our dedicated venue staff, who ensure that our events are successful and address any unexpected issues that arise.
